Inerrancy Defined

"By this word [inerrancy] we mean that the Scriptures possess the quality of freedom from error. They are exempt from the liability to mistake, incapable of error. In all their teachings they are in perfect accord with the truth."

- Deductive Reasoning
- Major Premise: God always speaks the truth and cannot lie (Romans 3:4; I John 1:5–7).
- Minor Premise: The entire Bible was spoken by God (2 Timothy 3:16–17; 2 Peter 1:20–21).
- Conclusion: The Bible is true.
